

### Production of 3,6-anhydro-L-galactose from red algae using acidic ionic liquids

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3,6-anhydro-L-galactose (L-AHG) is a major component of agarose, naturally occurring in red algae. Current technology in the production of agaro-oligosaccharides (D-galactose and L-AHG) in red algae is acid hydrolysis at high temperatures leading to over-degradation of the released monosugars. In this study, L-AHG was extracted from red algae, *Gelidium amansii* using acidic ionic liquids (IL). The choice of ionic liquids as well as the reaction conditions (e.g. time, temperature) was optimized for highest L-AHG yield and low byproduct formation. Acidity of the ionic liquids tested were determined using Hammett parameter,  $H_0$  and it was found out that slightly acidic ILs gave the highest L-AHG yields. Overall results show the potential of red algae as a renewable resource for the production of valuable chemicals.
